Dear Members of the Northeastern community,

The prevalence of sexual assault is among the most serious issues facing colleges and universities today. Beyond published statistics, we know that incidents of sexual violence remain underreported. As a community, we have the obligation to redouble our efforts to prevent sexual violence at every turn and to foster a campus climate of mutual tolerance and respect.

Last November, Northeastern conducted its first campus climate survey. The survey was designed to assess students' knowledge and perceptions of prohibited sexual conduct, and to better understand how students respond when incidents occur. The university's goal in undertaking the survey was to determine what it is doing well and what additional resources are necessary to most effectively prevent and respond to incidents of sexual violence on campus.

Today, the university is making good on its pledge to release the results of last year's climate survey. Some 25.6 percent of Northeastern undergraduate and graduate students responded to the voluntary, confidential survey. This is considered a strong response rate for a survey of its kind and ensures that the university can take confidence in the veracity of the results. We are making this announcement at the start of the academic year to raise the community's awareness about the continued importance of our work in this area.

First, some encouraging news. In many ways, the recent strides the university has made to provide victims of sexual violence with access to support services and other resources appear to be paying off. More than 73 percent of respondents agreed or strongly agreed with the statement, "If a friend or I were to be a victim of sexual violence, I know where to go to get help." In addition, more than 81 percent of respondents said they were likely or very likely to use campus services or support in the event they encountered sexual violence.

Similarly, the survey suggests our efforts to enhance campus safety, increase awareness of risky behavior, and create a culture of bystander intervention are having an impact. More than 95 percent of respondents agree or strongly agree that they feel safe on campus. In addition, some 93 percent said they were likely or very likely to intervene when they suspect a peer might become a victim of sexual violence. Importantly, the same percentage said they were likely or very likely to ask someone who had too much to drink if they needed help getting home. And 91 percent agreed or strongly agreed with the statement "most Northeastern students would respect someone who did something to prevent an instance of sexual violence."

At the same time, the climate survey clearly shows that more work remains to be done to prevent sexual violence on campus and to educate our community about the violence prevention and response resources available to members. In just one example, more than 21 percent of respondents admitted that they did not know the Code of Student Conduct's definition of consent. In addition, nearly 6 in 10 respondents indicated that they did not know that if they were victims of sexual violence they could have a no contact order issued to an alleged assailant by the Office of Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution (OSCCR) or have their class sections or other schedules changed.

More concerning still is the perception some students have that the university does not fully support victims of sexual violence. Nearly 11 percent of respondents doubt that the university would take the report of an instance of sexual violence seriously. In addition, 16 percent disagree or strongly disagree that the university would support a victim of sexual violence on campus who made a report. And more than 25 percent of respondents disagree or strongly disagree that the university would take corrective action against a perpetrator of sexual violence on campus.

To be sure, these results clearly point to challenges that need to be handled head on. We intend to redouble our efforts and address them openly and directly. We have already implemented a number of initiatives to fortify our response to these urgent matters. In cooperation with the Student Government Association (SGA), we completed a thorough review of the Code of Student Conduct and made a number of updates to the Code that clarify definitions, expectations and practice. We have actively engaged with the SGA leadership and other student leaders to review our efforts and resources and look forward to continuing this collaborative and intentional work.

Enhanced Prevention and Training. New online sexual violence prevention training (chosen with the help of our students) is now required for all incoming students. This interactive interpersonal violence prevention program is designed to provide students with greater awareness of these important issues, expectations for behavior and the resources that are available through the university for support. [Students can access the program here: https://studentsuccess.org/SP/northeastern.] Additional sexual violence prevention and awareness programs have been incorporated into Orientation and Welcome Week, as well as made available throughout the year. New programming continues our efforts to promote bystander intervention, and includes a focus on the issues of consent, boundaries and healthy relationships. We will also add staff within Student Affairs to develop programs and collaborate directly with student leaders and advocates. Faculty and staff will be required to receive enhanced training and all students will see increased training in the areas of proactive prevention education.

Second Campus Climate Survey. The university will conduct another campus climate survey this Fall to gather further data about sexual violence on campus and the outcomes from our enhanced prevention efforts.

Available Campus Resources. Sexual violence is not tolerated at Northeastern. Incidents of sexual violence should be reported to the Northeastern University Police Department (NUPD) or the Office of Institutional Diversity and Inclusion (OIDI). In addition, the university provides victims with a number of on-campus and off-campus resources to facilitate access to immediate confidential medical care and counseling services, incident reporting, and access to legal counsel. Information on services and resources of campus and community partners targeting sexual violence, stalking, and dating violence, can be found on the Violence Support, Intervention and Outreach Network (ViSION) webpage at www.northeastern.edu/vision. The university's WeCare team is also available to provide academic and personal support.

Moving forward, we must work together to sustain the progress made in addressing issues of sexual violence on our campus. Northeastern University is committed to creating and maintaining a community in which students, faculty, and staff can work and study in an atmosphere free from all forms of harassment. To be sure, challenges remain. But by working together, we will make Northeastern a place where all members of the community can feel safe to pursue their goals and aspirations.

Q18. Did you know that the University's Medical Amnesty policy says the following?

"Medical Amnesty Policy:

In cases of a drug or alcohol emergency, the primary concern is the health and safety of the individual(s) involved. Students/organizations are strongly encouraged to call for medical assistance (617.373.3333) for themselves or for another student who they observe to be or feel is dangerously intoxicated/under the influence of drugs. If a student/organization calls on behalf of another student, that student/organization is required to remain with the student experiencing the emergency until medical assistance arrives. Neither the caller nor student requiring medical assistance for an alcohol or other drug-related emergency will be subject to University disciplinary action for the violation of possession or consumption of alcohol or drugs. This policy shall extend to the referring student/organization who called for medical assistance.

The student requiring medical assistance (and possibly the referring student(s)/organization) will receive Medical Amnesty and will have a confidential "check in" meeting with a staff member from the Office of Prevention and Education at Northeastern (O.P.E.N.). As long as the student(s)/organization complies with all directives, there will be no disciplinary action taken related to the violation of possession or consumption of alcohol or drugs and no disciplinary record of the incident kept in the Office of Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution. This policy applies only to those students or organizations who seek emergency medical assistance in connection with an alcohol or drug-related medical emergency and does not apply to individuals experiencing an alcohol or drug-related medical emergency who are found by University employees (e.g., Northeastern University police, faculty, administrative staff, or residence hall staff), or where the reporting student(s)/organization did not stay with them.

The Medical Amnesty Policy is not intended to shield or protect those students or organizations that repeatedly violate the Code of Student Conduct. When repeated instances of drug or alcohol emergencies occur, the University reserves the right to take disciplinary action on a case-by-case basis regardless of the manner in which the incident was reported.

Medical amnesty applies only to alcohol or other drug-related emergencies but does not apply to other conduct violations such as but not limited to assault, property damage, or distribution of illicit substances. If other violations occur, then a student will face disciplinary charges for those violations. The use or abuse of alcohol or drugs is not considered a mitigating circumstance for any other violations of the Code of Student Conduct.

Medical amnesty applies only to the University response to a medical emergency. Criminal/police action may still occur separately from the Office of Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution.''

"CONSENT: Appropriate sexual behavior requires consent from all parties involved. Consent means a voluntary agreement to engage in sexual activity proposed by another and requires mutually understandable and communicated words and/or actions demonstrating agreement by both parties to participate in all sexual activities.

Consent may never be given by minors (in Massachusetts, those not yet 16 years of age), mentally disabled persons, or those who are incapacitated or intoxicated as a result of alcohol or other drug consumption (voluntary or involuntary) or those who are unconscious, unaware, or otherwise physically helpless. Physical force, threats, intimidating behavior, duress, or coercion cannot be used to gain consent. A person who is incapacitated or intoxicated cannot give consent to sexual activity with that person. Incapacitation is a state where one cannot make a rational, reasonable decision because they lack the ability to understand the who, what, when, where, why, or how of their sexual activities.

"Without consent" may be communicated by words and/or actions demonstrating unwillingness to engage in proposed sexual activity."
