

To All Members of the Northeastern Community:

I write to share the results of the university's sixth annual campus climate survey on sexual and gender-based harassment administered through the Spring 2020 semester.

This voluntary, confidential effort helps assess students' perceptions of sexual violence on campus. It also shines a light on areas where the university can enhance its education and prevention programs, and continuously improve coordination of resources for assault survivors. By sharing these results, we seek to raise the community's awareness about the ongoing importance of our work in this area.

Like the previous two years, the 2019-2020 survey was open to all full-time undergraduate, graduate, and law students. Instead of relying on a random sample, we invited all students to participate and have their voices heard. In all, the survey had a participation rate of 18 percent with nearly 5,000 respondents—an increase of 3 percentage points over the prior year.

Overall, the survey reflects an encouraging positive trend on almost every measure. Most notably, we saw significant decreases in rates of sexual violence victimization and increases in knowledge of and trust in university resources.

### **Safe Campus Climate**

For the sixth year in a row, we saw a very high level of Northeastern students expressing that they feel safe on campus (95 percent; up two percentage points from last year). In addition, three-quarters of students (76 percent) believe there is a good support system on campus for students going through difficult times—up 11 percentage points from the prior year. More than nine in ten students (94 percent) believe they have a shared role in making Northeastern a safe and supportive community.

### **Decreases in Reported Incidence of Sexual Violence**

While we know that any number of students experiencing sexual violence is unacceptable, we are heartened to see the lowest reported percentages to date of students who report having experienced sexual assault on campus. This includes reports of sexual touching without consent (13.1 percent, down 6.2 percent from last survey), attempted sexual penetration without consent (4.3 percent, down 2.9 percent), and sexual penetration without consent (3.3 percent, down 1.8 percent).

In addition, we saw our lowest percentage to date of students having experienced stalking (2.8 percent, down 2.5 percent). There was also a large decrease in reported experiences of sexual harassment, from 19.2 percent on 2018-19 survey to 9.3 percent in last year—although this decrease may be partly attributed to separating out gender-based harassment into its own new question.

### **Increased Awareness of Sexual Violence Rights and Resources**

Importantly, the percentage of students who reported knowing the Title IX definition of consent reached an all-time high (91.3 percent) in last year's survey. Additionally, a higher percentage of respondents agreed or strongly agreed that the university would take reports of sexual violence seriously (88 percent, up 8 points), protect the safety of the person making a report (89 percent, up 10 points), take corrective action against the offender (77%, up 13 points), take steps to protect the person

making a report from retaliation (84%, up 10 points), and limit the disclosure of information to those who need to know (90%, up 3 points).

Since we began asking the question in 2014, we saw the highest percentage of students (84 percent) indicate that they know where to get help if they or a friend experienced sexual violence. More students also noted that if they experienced sexual assault, harassment, stalking, and/or domestic or intimate partner violence in the future that they would likely use campus services, indicating a greater student trust in university resources (77 percent, up 8 points from last year).

Compared to last year, a higher percentage of students reported that they were aware of the rights and remedies for students who experienced sexual violence. This includes receiving counseling and medical care (79 percent, up 4 points), seeking a no-contact order through the Office of Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution (OSCCR) (68 percent, up 9 points), pursuing disciplinary action through OSCCR (77 percent, up 5 points), seeking a judicial order or restraining order (79 percent, up 1 point), receiving an alternate housing arrangement (62 percent, up 2 points), changing class sections (59 percent, up 3 points), and reporting the incident without receiving disciplinary action for other conduct violations (70 percent, up 4 points).

### **Enhanced Bystander Intervention**

The university's efforts to expand and enhance bystander intervention training are paying clear dividends. Over 91 percent of students reported that they understand how to respond compassionately if a friend were to disclose that they had experienced sexual violence. More than 90 percent also said they were likely or very likely to intervene if they saw someone crossing sexual boundaries without another person's consent, and were also likely or very likely to intervene if they heard someone saying it was okay to have sex with someone incapacitated or passed out due to alcohol or other drug use.

### **Opportunities for Continued Improvement**

Despite positive trends and continued progress on many fronts, areas for improvement remain.

### Gender-based Harassment

For the first time, this year the survey asked about experiences of gender-based harassment. Nearly 6 percent of respondents reported experiencing gender-based harassment. Some 45 percent of those experiencing gender-based harassment reported experiencing it during class or while completing academic assignments. Further, 59 percent of those experiencing gender-based harassment reported it was another Northeastern student who harassed them, while 19 percent reported being harassed by a Northeastern faculty or staff member.

### Respectful Environment

This year, 19 percent of respondents reported hearing other students make sexist remarks and 30 percent of students reported hearing negative comments about someone else's body or attractiveness frequently or very frequently. While the frequency of these comments has continued to decrease significantly (down 28% and 38% respectively from 2018-2019), this still remains an area of attention and concern.

### Incident Reporting

There was a slight increase (from 5 percent in 2018-2019 to 6 percent in 2019-2020) in the percentage of students who chose to report their experiences of sexual violence directly to the Northeastern

University Police Department (NUPD) or the Office of University Equity and Compliance/Title IX Coordinator.

Among those who experienced sexual violence and/or sexual harassment, the top three reasons students said they did not report the incident to NUPD or the Office of University Equity and Compliance included, "Didn't think it was serious or it wasn't clear harm was intended (54 percent)," "It was a private matter, I wanted to deal with it on my own (48 percent)," and "Didn't have time" (22 percent)."

About 20 percent of respondents who experienced sexual violence and/or sexual harassment did not report the incident because they "didn't think anything would be done," down 10 percent from last year. While this reduction (in addition to other measures) indicates progress is being made in students' trust in reporting resources, there is still work to be done.

### **Student Education**

As you may know, all incoming students, including graduate students, are required to complete an online and interactive interpersonal violence prevention program. This video-based program provides critical information about consent, bystander intervention, sexual assault, dating and domestic violence, stalking, sexual harassment, and much more.

Northeastern's Up2Us program, which provides training about healthy consent, proactive bystander intervention, resource options and how to support survivors, continues to reach more students every year. This year, the survey revealed 21 percent of respondents had participated in Up2Us at some point during the course of their studies at Northeastern, up from 15 percent last academic year.

Importantly, a greater percentage of students who participated in Up2Us reported more trust that the university would take a series of actions after a report of sexual violence than those who had never participated in the program. Students who participated in Up2Us also reported greater knowledge of Northeastern's definition of consent, a greater knowledge of campus resources, better understanding of how to support those affected by sexual violence, and report higher likelihood of intervening if they saw someone crossing sexual boundaries without another person's consent.

This year, an <u>asynchronous version of Up2Us</u> can be accessed on canvas and is available for anyone in the university community to take.

### **Resources and Support**

As a reminder, the Sexual Violence Resource Center at the Office for Prevention and Education at Northeastern (OPEN) continues to serve as a confidential entry point for survivors of sexual violence. Staff can help to connect survivors with information about on-campus and off-campus resources and reporting options. This year, they published a new guide for survivors to learn more about the impacts of trauma and explore ways to cope after experiencing sexual violence: We Believe You: Information on Trauma and Coping for Survivors of Sexual Violence. OPEN continues to update their website with community resources and services that can be accessed virtually at this time and shares about community events and resources for survivors on their Instagram @openortheastern.

With the goal of making more services more broadly accessible, <u>University Health and Counseling Services</u> (UHCS), in conjunction with OPEN, continues to provide a psychoeducational support group, HEAL, for survivors of sexual violence. The university's <u>We Care</u> team is also available to provide academic and personal support.

### Title IX policy

The U.S. Department of Education's new Title IX regulations regarding campus sexual harassment went into effect in August 2020. Northeastern updated its <u>Title IX Policy</u> to be in compliance with the new federal regulations and also updated the Policy on Sexual Harassment (now the University's <u>Policy on Sexual and Gender Based Harassment</u>) to address conduct that is now outside the scope of Title IX.

The Biden Administration recently announced that it would begin a review of the new Title IX regulations. The review—which may consider reinstating a more expansive definition of sexual harassment and expanding institutions' jurisdiction over prohibited conduct—will take up to two years. Northeastern will continue to closely monitor expected forthcoming interim guidance related to the review.

Any person who becomes aware of any allegation of sexual violence is strongly encouraged to report such information the <u>Office of University Equity and Compliance</u> (OUEC) or the <u>Northeastern University Police Department (NUPD)</u>.

### Q22. Did you know that the Title IX Policy's definition of consent is the following?

Consent means a voluntary, affirmative agreement to engage in sexual activity proposed by another; it requires mutually understandable and communicated words and/or actions that would demonstrate to a reasonable person agreement by both parties to participate in sexual activity.

Sexual activity requires consent from all involved parties. Consent must be freely given, without physical force, threats, intimidating behavior, duress, or coercion. Silence, a lack of resistance, previous sexual relationships or experiences and/or a current relationship may not, in itself, constitute consent. The initiator, or the person who wants to engage in the specific sexual activity, must obtain consent from the partner(s) for each sexual act. Each participant may be an initiator at different points of sexual activity. If confusion or ambiguity arises during sexual activity, participants are encouraged to stop and clarify a mutual willingness to continue that activity.

A person's initiation of a sexual act constitutes consent to that act, but not necessarily to subsequent acts. Consent to sexual activity may be withdrawn at any time and the withdrawal must be communicated in mutually understandable words and/or actions; if so, sexual activity must cease immediately. Consent may never be given by minors (in Massachusetts, minors are those not yet 16 years of age), mentally disabled persons, or those who are incapacitated as a result of intoxication by alcohol or other drug consumption (voluntary or involuntary), or those who are unconscious, unaware, or otherwise physically helpless.

Engaging in sexual activity while under the influence of alcohol or drugs may create ambiguity for either party as to whether consent has been sought or given. A person who has consumed alcohol and/or drugs still has a responsibility to obtain consent for any sexual activity with another person(s). Being impaired by alcohol or other drugs is no defense to any violation of this Policy.

### Q35. Since you've been at Northeastern, have you experienced stalking?

Stalking is defined in the Title IX Policy as a "willful and/or malicious pattern of conduct or series of acts directed at a specific person which seriously alarms or annoys that person and would cause a reasonable person to fear bodily injury or to suffer substantial emotional distress."

Examples include someone making you fear for your personal safety by persistently:

- Posting messages, pictures, or video on social networking sites
- Making unwanted phone calls, emails, voice, text or instant messages
- Showing up somewhere you did not want that person to be

### Q36. Since you've been at Northeastern, have you experienced sexual harassment?

Sexual harassment is defined in the Title IX Policy as "any unwanted or offensive sexual behavior that has the purpose or effect of creating a hostile living, learning, or working environment, or whenever toleration of such conduct or the rejection of it is the basis for a personal or academic decision affecting the individual. Sexual harassment may be found in a single episode, as well as in persistent behavior."

A hostile environment "exists when the conduct is sufficiently severe, persistent, or pervasive that it unreasonably interferes with or deprives an individual from participating in or benefiting from the university's education or employment programs and/or activities. Conduct must be deemed severe, persistent, or pervasive from both a subjective and an objective perspective."

### **Examples include:**

- · Saying crude or offensive sexual jokes, comments, or stories to you when you didn't want to hear them
- Trying to get you to talk about sexual matters you don't want to discuss
- Sending you offensive sexual remarks, jokes, stories, pictures, or videos that you didn't want
- Making crude or offensive comments about your or someone else's body, appearance, or sexual activity

### Q37. Since you've been at Northeastern, have you experienced gender-based harassment?

Gender-based harassment includes harassment based on gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, or gender expression that has the purpose or effect of creating a hostile living learning, or working environment.

A hostile environment "exists when the conduct is sufficiently severe, persistent, or pervasive that it unreasonably interferes with or deprives an individual from participating in or benefiting from the university's education or employment programs and/or activities. Conduct must be deemed severe, persistent, or pervasive from both a subjective and an objective perspective."

### Examples include another person(s):

- Repeatedly and on purpose, making derogatory or dismissive remarks about your gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, or gender expression
